REMINDER: Short skirts and pants (including Capri pants) and sandals are prohibited in Creighton labs. This is to protect your feet and legs in case of dropped objects or chemicals. Dress for the hazards of your location.

ETHANOL WASTE As a reminder, waste ethanol in concentrations over 24% by volume are hazardous waste and *must* be disposed of as hazardous waste, due to its flammability. We appreciate your cooperation in this matter.

TORNADO SAFETY It's that time of year again, when the possibility of severe weather, including tornadoes, is very high. Do you know where your storm shelter is? Please check our website to see the list of where the shelters are; know where to go in your area *before* the storm hits!

BIOHAZARD BAGS As a reminder, *only* items that are biohazardous should be put into the red or orange biohazard bags. Biohazardous items must then be disposed of through our vendor, Stericycle. Biohazard bags that have been autoclaved can be placed in the designated trash bins for removal. Please **do not** put regular trash into these bags or put them into the regular trash. Our hazardous waste vendor and custodians will not accept items in biohazard bags.
