Advice Corner— Advice for a Successful Professional School application

Linh Do, recently admitted to Creighton University's Doctorate of Occupational Therapy program, shares his advice for successfully applying to professional school.


Applying to a professional school can be a long, stressful, and tedious process. If done correctly, however, the rewards can be extremely gratifying. Here is a list of some things you should not forget to do to make the process a little smoother:

1) Make sure you engage in some type of job shadowing or observation hours in the field you are interested in. This will come in handy when you create your personal résumé and personal statement.

- 2) Set aside some time during the week for volunteering at a hospital or other type of community service.
- 3) Be involve with at least 3 different clubs, with at least one related to your intended major. This will assists you with seeking helpful job shadowing opportunities and professional development.
- 4) Meet with your advisor regularly he or she can help you with registering for the

classes that are required for your major.

- 5) Apply for any scholarships you qualify for.
- 6) Do mock interviews to prepare for your actual interview, this can make a significant impact both positively or negatively. Karen is a great person to see for this.
- 7) Start your applications early and submit early.
- 8) Have someone like Denise review your personal statement.
