

I felt as if I learned so much about myself and at the same time yearned to learn more. As I sat and listed to Sam High Crane, I longed to speak to my grandmother to learn more about where I came from, and it brought a phrase to my mind:

"You won't know where you are going, if you don't know where you have been!"

he spoke about the diminishing or "dying" culture, it really hit home. As a Mexican American, I see many first generation Latinos lose were they come from. They can't speak the language, they lost many customs, and many deny being of Latino decent, or are even ashamed of being Latino. This trip subsequent exposure another culture not allowed me to learn about another culture encouraged me to keep my culture close to my heart. We must all accept who we are and where we come from.
