

Anyone in Student Support Services can apply to go on the trips. Josh helps interview applicants to select the students that are serious about the mission of the trip.

The Immersion Experience By Josh Phelps

During the recent Fall Break, a group of seven Creighton SSS students and Katie Cannella - went on an immersion trip to the Navajo Nation Reservation to promote college access and the Gates Millennium Scholarship as well as get students excited prepared for the college experience.

The group drove more than 2,500 miles to visit with over 145 students, in more than 10 classrooms, at three high schools in Gallup, and Chinle. Creighton students have been participating in the trip to New Mexico and Arizona since the Fall of 2006 and each year, helped more students apply for and earn the Gates Scholarship.

During the trip, the Creighton students conducted presentations and workshops for college bound junior and senior students. The presentations focused o n the requirements of the various scholarship essays and examples of strong applications. After presenting, the Creighton students held workshops to edit scholarship essays, brainstorm essay topic ideas, and assist with resume development.

If Yitong could have any super power, it would be to communicate with animals. She would love to know how animals feel and what they are thinking. What a caring person!


If a movie was made about Yitong's life, she says it would be about her immigration from China to the United States in 2006 because it was a significant transformation in her life.
