Recruitment is a mutual selection process by which both you and the sororities will determine the right place for you. Recruitment is an opportunity for you to visit all the chapters on campus and determine if Greek Life is for you.

General Information Night

This is the time for you to meet the women of each sorority, learn about their various programs, ask questions, explore Greek Life, and find out why Greek women are so enthusiastic about their organizations.

Philanthropy Night

During the second evening of Recruitment, the sorority women will assist you in a service project to benefit their national or local philanthropies. This is a rewarding way to experience true Greek Life at Creighton.

Skit Day

Each sorority will perform skits, or present programs to illustrate what Greek Life is all about. This is one of the most memorable days of the week.

Preference Parties

Perhaps the most meaningful and formal day of Recruitment, this day is a quiet time when sorority women get a chance to show you what sorority life means to them.

What to Wear

Day 1– Thursday

Potential New Members will attend a party given by each sorority. It is important to dress comfortably but appropriately. Keep in mind that you may be sitting on the floor to watch a short video. A nice skirt, slacks, or casual dress is fine.

Day 2— Friday

Potential New Members will be doing five service projects that may involve crafts or sitting on the floor. Nice jeans or slacks are appropriate for this day.

Day 3— Saturday

Potential New Members will attend a maximum of three parties on Day 3, at which you will be watching skits. Nice pants or a long skirt would be appropriate, as you will be sitting on the floor.

Day 4– Sunday

On this day, Potential New Members will attend no more than two preference parties, at which the mood will be more serious and reflective. A nice skirt or dress you would wear to the theater or a nice dinner is appropriate. Preferably no black dresses, please.

What is a Rho Mu?

A Recruitment Mentor, or Rho Mu, is a member of one of the Panhellenic women's fraternities who temporarily disaffiliates herself with that sorority in order to be a Recruitment Mentor and guide you, the potential new member, through recruitment.

The Panhellenic Council selects Rho Mus based upon enthusiasm for sorority life, objectivity, and dependability. These women have experience with Greek Life and the Greek Community. They know about the many benefits that come with being Greek.

Many questions will arise throughout the recruitment process and these women are here to help you so feel free to ask them anything. Since she is unaffiliated, her answers to your questions will be truthful and not biased. The Rho Mu's job during recruitment is to help you and to make the week easier for you in whatever way she is able.

What is Panhellenic?

In joining a sorority, you become part of Creighton's Panhellenic community, which is comprised of five sororities. Each sorority is (inter)nationally affiliated and is a part of the National Panhellenic Conference, which includes 26 women's fraternities.

As a potential sorority member, you will benefit to think of the recruitment process as a way of becoming a member of the Panhellenic community rather than a member of one sorority. This encourages you to look at the five sororities with an open mind, and learn about each sorority and what it has to offer. Panhellenic is a reminder that we all share a common bond of sisterhood. Creighton's Panhellenic Association is governed by eight executive officers and a council made up of two delegates from each sorority who serve as a liaison between her chapter and PHA. The Panhellenic Council plans and supervises formal recruitment and coordinates other Greek-related events on campus in conjunction with the Interfraternity Council.

The Panhellenic Creed

We, as Undergraduate Members of women's fraternities, stand for good scholarship, for guarding of good health, for maintenance of fine standards, and for serving, to the best of our ability, our college community. Cooperation for furthering fraternity life, in harmony with its best possibilities, is the ideal that shall guide our fraternity activities.

Potential New Member's Rights

You have the right to be treated as an individual

You have a right to be fully informed about the recruitment process and about the binding agreement implicit in the preference card signing

You have the right to ask questions and receive true and objective answers from Recruitment Mentors and Members

You have the right to be treated as a capable and mature person without being patronized

You have the right to have inviolable confidentiality when sharing information with Recruitment Mentors

You have the right to make informed choices without undue pressure from others

You have the right to make your own decisions and accept full responsibility for the results of those decisions

You have the right to have a positive, safe and enriching recruitment and new member experience

Creighton University's Policy on Hazing

Creighton University strictly prohibits hazing—in any form, at any time—including hazing in connection with training, indoctrination, qualification for membership, functions or activities, or initiations conducted or sponsored by any student organization. "Hazing" includes any action taken or situation created, whether on or off campus, intended to produce or which may forseeably produce unusual or unnecessary mental or physical discomfort or pain, embarrassment, harassment, ridicule or risk of physical, mental or emotional harm or injury. "Hazing" also includes any action or situation which is intended to be or which may foreseeably be morally, physically, emotionally or mentally degrading to any individual, or which unnecessarily exposes any individual to any risk of physical, mental or emotional harm, injury or distress beyond the risks encountered in ordinary daily life, or which is intended to intimidate or has the effect of intimidating any individual to unwillingly or reluctantly engage in any activity, or which unreasonably interferes with scholastic activities or pursuits of any individual.

Potential New Member Agreement

A woman in eligible for participation if she is a regularly matriculated student at Creighton University, must be enrolled in at least 12 credits and have a cumulative QPA of 2.5 or better.

A Potential New Member shall not be, or ever have been, an initiated member of an NPC group (If in doubt, consult Panhellenic Council or the Greek Advisor).

A woman is ineligible for Recruitment if she has been a pledge of any NPC fraternity on this campus within the same calendar year.

A \$28 registration fee must be paid in full to participate in Recruitment before January 1, 2009. After January 1st, a \$32 registration fee is implemented.

A Potential New Member shall attend orientation and all parties to which she has accepted invitations. A Potential New Member will be removed from recruitment if she does not attend the maximum number of parties possible. In the event of illness or other emergency, she shall notify Panhellenic and or her Recruitment Mentor if she cannot attend.

Potential New Member Agreement (Continued)

A Potential New Member shall go to the Student Activities Office before withdrawing from Recruitment. In such an event, the Potential New Member shall fill out an official withdrawal form.

No Women's Fraternity Member may buy anything for a Potential New member and no Potential New Member may buy anything for a women's fraternity member during the formal recruitment period.

A Potential New Member shall not promise, verbally or written, to join a certain fraternity before Panhellenic issues formal bids. A Potential New Member shall fill out the Preferential Bid Form directly after the last party she attends. Once a form has been sent, no changes may be made. Sending of the preference card means that the Potential New Member will accept an invitation to join any sorority she indicates.

Any Potential New Member attending Recruitment events under the influence of non-prescription drugs or alcohol may be removed from the recruitment process and may not be invited to join a sorority.

It will be up to the discretion of Panhellenic Council and Greek Advisor to make this decision.
