Private Scholarships:

Executive Women International (EWI) ASIST Scholarship: The Adult Students in Scholastic Transition (ASIST) program helps finance the college education of adults who cannot simply pay for it. The ASIST scholarship program is available through different EWI chapters all over the United States. EWI awards \$2,500 to each deserving recipient, which is inclusive of tuition. Every EWI chapter has its own application deadline, so be check with your local chapter.

Adventures in Education (AIE): AIE is a non-profit organization that provides financial assistance to help students complete their journey through college. Founded in 1995, it is among the first websites dedicated to helping students obtain financial aid. AIE has an adult scholarship worth \$3,000 to \$5,500. Applicants must demonstrate their academic potential through job accomplishments and active community involvement. <http://www.aie.org>

Talbots Women's Scholarship Fund: Five women will each be awarded \$10,000 and 50 women will each be awarded \$1,000. Applicants must be undergraduate degree-seeking students at accredited two- or four-year institutions or vocational-technical schools. Only applicants seeking a bachelor's degree from a four-year institution are eligible to receive the \$10,000 award. Awards are based on financial need and prior achievements for women who earned their H.S. diploma/GED at least 10 years ago. <http://www.talbots.com/about/scholar/scholar.asp>

AAIA Displaced Homemaker Scholarship: The Association on American Indian Affairs offers awards for \$1000 to men and women who would not otherwise be able to complete their educational goals due to family responsibilities. Awards are given to full time students for tuition, child care, transportation and living expenses, during the first semester. Students must reapply each year. Deadline for application is July 20. <http://www.indian-affairs.org>

AFCEA Scholarship for Working Professionals: \$1,500 is awarded to students pursuing an undergraduate degree while employed in the science and technology fields directly related to the mission of AFCEA. Applicants must be at least second-year students attending an accredited institution in the U.S. part-time (two classes per semester) with a declared science or technology major <http://www.afcea.org/scholarships/workingstudents/default.asp>

Datatel Angelfire Scholarship: Honoring soldiers who have served during combat, this scholarship is for outstanding students attending an eligible Datatel client institution, who served the US military in the Asian theater (Vietnam, Cambodia, or Laos) during 1964-1975, in Operation Desert Storm, Operation Enduring Freedom and/or Operation Iraqi Freedom. Full and part-time students (taking at least six credit hours) are eligible. Awards range from \$1,000 to \$2,400 depending on the institution. http://www.datatel.com/datatel/index_datatel.cfm/222/

Datatel Returning Student Scholarship: For outstanding students currently attending an eligible Datatel client institution who have returned to school after an absence of five years or longer. Full- and part-time (taking at least six credit hours) students are eligible to apply. The top rated fifty applications for the Returning Student scholarship are awarded \$1,500 each. http://www.datatel.com/datatel/index_datatel.cfm/222/

Golden Key's GEICO Life Scholarship: This award recognizes outstanding members of Golden Key who achieve academic excellence while balancing commitments such as family and/or career. Ten \$1,000 awards given annually. <http://www.goldenkey.org/GKweb/ScholarshipsandAwards/ScholarshipListing/PartnerScholarships.htm>

The Non-Traditional Student Scholarship: Scholarships are available for returning students with a period of absence from schooling or with at least one year of college with demonstrated financial need. Applicants must be members of The American Legion, the American Legion Auxiliary, or Sons of The American Legion and enrolled at least part-time. A \$1,000 scholarship is awarded in each Division. <http://www.legion-aux.org/scholarships/docs/nontradsch.html> 3

COURSE SCHEDULE

FALL: Accelerated CREIGHTON 8-Week Courses

The Wal-Mart Higher REACH Scholarships: Awards are given to non-traditional students who have been employed by Wal-Mart Stores, Inc. for at least one year as of February 1. Students may receive up to \$2,000 a year (award amount varies depending on enrollment). Candidates must be able to identify their career goals and meet educational and financial requirements. <http://www.walmartfoundation.org/wmstore/goodworks/scripts/index.jsp>

Career Development Grants: These grants support women who hold a bachelor's degree and are preparing to advance their careers, change careers, or re-enter the work force. Special consideration is given to AAUW members, women of color, and women pursuing their first advanced degree or credentials in nontraditional fields. Awards range from \$2,000 to \$8,000. http://www.aauw.org/fga/fellowships_grants/career_development.cfm

Career Advancement Scholarship: Scholarships are provided to disadvantaged women who wish to further their education and advance in their career or will soon enter or re-enter the workforce. http://www.bpwusa.org/content/BPWFoundation/SignatureProgramsandPublications/CareerAdvancementScholarship/scholarships_introtxt.htm

ELCA (Luthern) scholarships for Lutheran laywomen: This award provides assistance to Lutheran women studying for a career other than ordained ministry. <http://www.womenoftheelca.org/whatWeDo/scholarships.html>

ELCA (Luthern) scholarships for administrative leadership: The Arne Administrative Scholarship is given to women interested in reaching the top of their field as administrators. Students may attend school full-time, in the evening or summer sessions. <http://www.womenoftheelca.org/whatWeDo/scholarships.html>

EFWA (Accounting) Women in Transition (WIT) Scholarship: Eligible applicants will generally have few marketable job skills since they have functioned primarily in the role of a homemaker or do not possess a college degree. Applicants should be incoming or current freshman, or returning to school with freshman status. Recipients will be awarded up to \$16,000 over 4 years to pursue a degree in accounting. <http://www.efwa.org/scholarships.htm>

EFWA (Accounting) Women in Need (WIN) Scholarship: Eligible applicants will be farther along in the degree process than WIT applicants, but have few marketable job skills since they have functioned primarily in the role of a homemaker prior to entering a degree program. Applicants should have sufficient credits to qualify for junior status. Up to \$2,000 awarded annually to pursue a college degree in accounting. <http://www.efwa.org/scholarships.htm>

Jeannette Rankin Foundation: Awards given to low-income women (over age 35) who have a vision of how their education will benefit themselves, their families and their communities. The \$2000 awards are given in the Fall. Award usage is not limited to tuition expenses. <http://www.rankinfoundation.org>

Linda Lael Miller Scholarships: These scholarships are awarded to non-traditional female students, age 25 or older, who have a difficult time finding scholarships for which they qualify. As in previous years, the scholarship funds may be used not only for tuition and books, but for child care, transportation and expenses not covered by traditional scholarships. <http://www.lindaelmiller.com/scholarships/scholarships.asp>

P.E.O. Program for Continuing Education: Grants up to \$1,500 for educational expenses, (e.g., tuition, books, transportation, childcare) given to women whose education has been interrupted and who find it necessary to resume studies due to changing demands in their lives. <http://www.peointernational.org/projects/policies-pce.php>

R.T.N. Scholarship for Continuing Education: This award is for single parent women who would like to go to school or continue with their education, but have been denied sufficient resources. <http://www.raisethe nation.org>

Society of Women Engineers Reentry Scholarships: Restricted to women who have been out of the engineering workforce or out of school for a minimum of two years prior to reentry. Students may attend undergraduate, graduate or doctoral programs, full or part time. <http://www.societyofwomenengineers.org/scholarships/schlrtn.htm>

Soroptimist's Women's Opportunity Awards: This award assists women entering or re-entering the workforce in obtaining the education and skills training needed to improve employment status. Students may be enrolled in vocational/skills training programs or undergraduate degree programs. Awards may be used for any expenses related to their educational pursuits. Awards vary up to \$10,000. <http://www.soroptimist.org>

TEACH Grant: For students enrolled in teaching programs who intend to teach in a high need field at a primary or secondary school that serves low income students. Students must complete the FAFSA, be enrolled as an undergraduate, graduate, or post-baccalaureate student in an institution that has chosen to participate in the TEACH program to receive up to \$4000 per year. <http://studentaid.ed.gov/PORTALSWebApp/students/english/TEACH.jsp>
