### Some Campus News from Father Schlegel:

#### **Tobacco-Free Campus**

At Father Schlegel's request, Dr. Syed Mohiuddin, Chair of Internal Medicine in the School of Medicine, is chairing a strategy workgroup to address the myriad issues associated with the implementation of a tobacco-free policy at Creighton University. Dr. Mohiuddin oversaw the implementation of a successful tobacco-free pilot at the Cardiac Center. Working with Dr. Mohiuddin on the workgroup are representatives from multiple areas, including Human Resources, the Wellness Council, Creighton Student Union, Facilities Management and the Staff Advisory Council. The President's Cabinet will receive regular updates on the progress of the workgroup and will review and approve the proposal before implementation. The target date for policy implementation is 7/1/08. This is an extremely important issue for the Creighton community, and I encourage you to provide suggestions and comments to the workgroup to assist them in their deliberations.

#### **Emergency Situations**

The ability to communicate in an emergency or crisis situation is important for any college or university campus. To assist us in our communication efforts, Creighton University is offering a new emergency broadcast system (EBS) using cell phone text messaging. At the same time, the University is looking at additional enhancements. Already, we have over 3,000 students, faculty and staff registered, but we need to try and get everyone registered! Once you are registered, the EBS will send out a brief text message that will inform you about any emergency or crisis situation. # EXCITING TIMES AT CREIGHTON UNIVERSITY

It is difficult not to get excited about working with Facilities Management at Creighton University as we look into the very near future. I will ramble through some of the highlights:

- Soon the contractor will be selected for building the new Athletics Center. The Center will be primarily for Women's basketball and volleyball. It is anticipated that the building will be completed in Jan',09. You can see the progress with the site work now happening with the demolition of KB Kar Kare. Steve King and Daryl Baker moved their recycle center into a warehouse formerly owned by O'Keefe Elevator so K B Kar Kare could be demolished. Funding for the Athletics Center is available from gifts to the University.
- A big factory building is being built near the airport. When done, Modern Equipment will trade Creighton its
  property for the new building and they will be moving from their site along Cuming Street. Sometime in the fall of
  2008, the former Modern Equipment buildings will be demolished. Lou Marcuccio is studying how the two newer
  metal buildings along Burt Street could be used by the University for storage or other functions. Funding for the
  new Modern Equipment Building is from an anonymous donor.
- A study recently completed about how North Omaha can be redeveloped indicates the rebuilding of Cuming Street around 16<sup>th</sup> to 27<sup>th</sup> Street. The north side of Cuming could be developed into storefronts with housing on the upper levels. This will create some nice opportunities for students to move near campus. The plan also calls for a new look at 24<sup>th</sup> and Cuming.
- Creighton has been awarded funds from the Federal Government for construction of a facility that will house the
  University shuttle system and the MAT bus transfer station. This endeavor to meet the expanding numbers of bus
  riders will also house the Public Safety offices. Construction of the facility could easily start in 2008. If you are
  keeping track, this is two new buildings under construction at the same time.
- Omaha sewer separation will impact Creighton. It is planned to install large sewer pipes in Webster from 15<sup>th</sup> to 20<sup>th</sup> Street going north on 20<sup>th</sup> to Cuming during 2008. The sewer separation gives us reason to think that Webster can go away as a street and become the pedestrian mall it is slated to become in the master plan. This will make driving pathway vehicles much easier. The parking on Webster Street will go away. Construction season 2009 will be complicated further when the big sewer lines are installed from 20<sup>th</sup> Street to 27<sup>th</sup> Street in Cuming. While this work is happening, early planning is that Cuming Street will be closed. Stay tuned for more information about Cuming.
- The Harper Center is scheduled to be opened in July, 2008. Lou is working on plans to move people into the space. Maria Jerrell has developed an operating budget for Facilities Management in the facility. Basically, we will provide routine cleaning and maintenance while events support is provided by the Student Services staff.
- The franchise to operate a Radiation Therapy Center is nearly put together. When the agreement is reached, a new building will be constructed west of 30<sup>th</sup> Street. The building will house state of the art cancer surgery technology and be a huge asset to Creighton and the City regarding cancer surgery. The building will not be large but it will require significant mechanical and electrical systems to support the computer technology. This is the third building that could be in construction in 2008.
- In addition to the work on sewer lines, Cuming Street will soon be a construction site for new bridges for Hi-Way 75. The last two bridges over Cuming Street will be replaced as will the last two bridges over Burt Street. The work will happen in 2008 and 2009. The State will also replace the two I-480 bridges over 24<sup>th</sup> Street. The southern bridge will be demolished in a couple of weeks. The northern bridge is scheduled to be demolished when the southern bridge can be reopened. Traveling around and through campus will be a challenge until about Christmas 2009.
- Creighton also has been awarded Federal funds to enhance the appearance of Burt Street and Cuming Street. The project is developing slowly because it needs to be coordinated around the bridge replacement project and the sewer separation project. It is fair to expect the work to happen in 2009 and could start late 2008. The Federal funding can also be used to build a pedestrian overpass over 24<sup>th</sup> Street just south of the Old Gym connecting to the parking garage. The overpass can easily be started in 2008 but may be better delayed a year because of all the other activity on the bridges over 24<sup>th</sup> Street.
- Through all this excitement, good work is going on. The Landscape Maintenance shop was recognized by the Nebraska master gardeners for the exquisite appearance of the campus. Kudos for the effort. They did this even with Jessica Heller carrying her yet to be born son. Congratulations Jessica and welcome to the world, William.
- Other good work includes the efforts to re-pipe Swanson Hall heating and air conditioning. The management of
  chemicals by EH&S is no small task as waste disposal is reduced. The University is looking at practices that
  sustain the environment including cleaning with new products to save the ozone layer. Facilities Management is
  reviewing documents that can find us a partner in energy conservation giving us an outcome of reduced energy
  consumption while freeing up part of the utility budget over time. The list can grow from here.

As I said, these are exciting times. Through it all you continue to provide clean and well maintained spaces for educating future leaders. You are to be commended for the efforts you give and the safe way you perform your work. Thank you for all you do and STAY SAFE!

You may also call the University Weather Hotline (402) 280-5800. The recording will indicate whether the University is operating under normal conditions, closed, a delayed start or curtailment of operations. If the decision is made to close, delay opening or curtail operations, charge the hours not worked to "excused time" on your timesheet.

In the event the University does not close, employees who may be concerned about safety in traveling to and from work may use their own judgment to stay home or leave work early (after consulting with your supervisor of course). However, you will be expected to charge the time off to vacation or leave without pay. **Sick time MAY NOT be used for this purpose.** 

Note: Please remember that if you have been identified as "Emergency Personnel", it is absolutely necessary you report for your normal shift schedule

## News from Planning and Design: Fran Angeroth

Planning and Design continues working on many projects across the campus both inside and out that will impact some but not all. To name just a few:

- California Mall phase 4 and 5 that is developing the pedestrian walk ways from the soccer stadium up to the Harper Center is taking shape and still on track to complete in early August.
- Creighton Hall (formerly the Administration Building) south exterior is getting a full restoration by cleaning, re-grouting, stone work and sealing. We are 4 weeks in to an 8 to 10 week schedule depending on the weather.
- Creighton Hall is also getting new exterior east, west and center stairs. The first floor lobby will have new paint, lights and two sets of front doors.
- Creighton Hall the Jesuit kitchen work to put in a new hood and kitchen equipment is due to start in late October.
- The Dundee Clinic will be moving from 50<sup>th</sup> and Dodge to 51<sup>st</sup> and Underwood to the old hardware store hopefully by April 1<sup>st</sup>.

- Kiewit Fitness Center replace hot tub HooRay!!! The second tub is on order and should arrive in 4 to 5 weeks.
- The Old Gym Data Center is at 95% complete construction drawings to update mechanical, electrical, UPS, emergency generator and layout of the center.
- Wareham Building (formerly O'Keefe building on 16th Street) renovation is picking up speed with interior walls going up.

The good news is, he is serving at the armory in Council Bluffs to prepare other soldiers before they ship out to the Middle East. He left the end of August and is not expected back for thirteen months.

We are starting to change over from summer cooling, to winter heating. This will be a slow process again this year due to the many buildings and different systems.

Again this year we want to remind everyone to be patient with all of us during this changeover time. It is difficult to determine the exact switchover date for each building. We have to consider weather patterns, the buildings HVAC systems, the buildings control system, and the building usage. We then try to coordinate with the building personnel to reach a mutually agreeable date for the switchover. However, since spring and fall temperatures can be extremely variable, even as much as 15° to 20° so it can put even the most sophisticated system to the test.

Most buildings have designed occupied hours of operation. To help save energy the building temperatures may be changed from normal operating set points during expected unoccupied hours. If you plan to work during a designated unoccupied period, you may encounter temperatures that are different than during occupied hours. Please dress accordingly.



# Fall gardening tips from Brian Nelson

As summer season comes to an end here are some tips that could keep your landscape looking beautiful through the fall. Since the weather has cooled it is safe to lower the mover blades for a shorter cut to make it easier to rake the leaves. Aerating the lawn helps breakup the hard soils which will allow easier air, water and nutrients to the roots. Applying the last round of fertilizer will help establish the root system of the grass.

For the annual plants that are in your landscapes you might want to cover them with a bed sheet for protection on the nights that are close to freezing. For the perennial plants and ornamental grasses, fall is a good time to cut them down to the ground. Fall is also the time to cut back your roses.

Working on trees in the fall is very important. Before the first freeze you can cover the base of the trunk with drainage pipe for protection from sun scald. After the trees go dormant you can cut the suckers, water sprouts, and dead branches from the tree. I recommend calling a local arborist to cut branches that can't be reached when you're standing on the ground. For large shrubs in the landscape, Fall is a perfect time to remove the dead branches from the inside of the plant. When removing any branches or trimming on shrubs, remember to only cut to one-third of the size of the plant.




