"High Skilled Immigration"

Imagine a naïve dream of coming to the US. Imagine that dream not having the power to live freely for decades because of their land of origin. Today a high-skilled immigrant from India could wait more than 20 years to be a full member of the US society, often tied to an employer, unable to change careers or start businesses and living temporarily in their minds. This is a story of four immigrants, a decade after they came to study in the US. It places a human face to the broken high-skilled immigration system. It sheds light on this largely unattended story of one million dreams waiting for freedom. It also highlights the need for reforming America's high-skilled immigration at a time of intense globalization and the retirement of the baby boomers.

Prakash Wadhwa, based in Kansas City, is the creator of the film "From The Land of Gandhi". He came to the US in 2003 to get his Master's degree in Chemical Engineering from the University of Missouri-Rolla. A decade of his own life experience through the US immigration system inspired the concept of "From The Land of Gandhi". The idea is to help raise awareness of US high-skilled immigration, and to help raise a voice on an issue impacting a million skilled immigrants from India.
