## Ali S. Khan, MD, MPH, MBA

Ali S. Khan is dean of the College of Public Health at the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) and a former assistant surgeon general with the U.S. Public Health Service. He completed a 23-year career as a senior director at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), which he joined as a disease detective, and where he led and responded to numerous high profile domestic and international public health emergencies. Dr. Khan was one of the main architects of CDC's national health security program and continues this work at UNMC, which has been nationally designated to prepare the American health care system to respond to outbreaks of high hazard pathogens. He also continues to actively support global outbreak responses such as the response for the West Africa Ebola outbreak in Sierra Leone and the Rohingya refugee crisis in Bangladesh as a member of World Health Organization (WHO) Global Outbreak Alert and Response Network (GOARN).

Dr. Khan received his medical degree from the State University of New York Downstate Medical Center in Brooklyn and has a Master of Public Health from Emory University's Rollins School of Public Health. He completed his pediatrics and internal medicine training at the University of Michigan. He has authored numerous papers and publications and has consulted extensively for multiple U.S. organizations, ministries of health, and WHO where he serves on the steering committee for GOARN. Dr. Khan is the author of *The Next Pandemic: On the Front Lines Against Humankind's Gravest Dangers*.





## Sade Kosoko-Lasaki, MD, MSPH, MBA, FAASS

Sade Kosoko-Lasaki is the associate vice provost for Health Sciences - Multicultural and Community Affairs (HS-MACA), and professor of surgery (ophthalmology), professor of preventive medicine and public health. Dr. Kosoko-Lasaki leads HS-MACA, with programs like the Post Baccalaureate and Pre-Matriculation, Health Careers Opportunity, Community-Oriented Primary Care, Health Disparities initiatives and pipeline programs with focus on community-based participatory research. She is the co-founder and co-director of the Center for Promoting Health and Health Equity (CPHHE), a community-academic partnership and collaboration that promotes health and health equity through research, education and multi-disciplinary interventions. Under this program, Dr. Kosoko-Lasaki spearheaded a team that drove projects to intensify the training and education drive of Community Health Advocates on the recent COVID-19 pandemic among the target minority groups in North and South Omaha with funding and support from Douglas County Health Department.

Dr. Kosoko-Lasaki has built collaborative relationships worldwide and serves as a community/academic leader in the Omaha area. She also oversees the recruitment of disadvantaged students to the health sciences, and mentors these students to retain them. She is a well-known international lecturer on cultural awareness and proficiency, health disparities issues, and promotion of pipeline programs.

As an ophthalmologist with public health and business administration degrees, Dr. Kosoko-Lasaki is passionate about training and educating individuals all around the world on blindness prevention, eliminating Vitamin A deficiency and glaucoma prevention and treatment on numerous action-oriented initiatives among the underserved population and in several developing countries.

## John R. Stone, MD, PhD

Dr. John Stone is a physician and philosopher/bioethicist. His focus is on social justice and population group inequities in health and health care, especially unjust inequalities related to race and ethnicity. His efforts include teaching, scholarship/writing and programs. He earned his BA at Emory University and his MD at Johns Hopkins University.

He is a professor within Creighton University School of Medicine and co-founder and co-executive director of Creighton's Center for Promoting Health and Health Equity. The Center is a community-academic partnership.



## Richard L. Brown, PhD, FACHE

Richard L. Brown is the President and CEO of Lee Brown and Associates, a health services management and consulting business since 2014. He provides coaching to health care executives and middle management training, and he also serves as an administration and governance consultant to the Bureau of Primary Health Care, conducting site visits throughout the U.S. He also serves as the executive director of the Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health (REACH) at Creighton University. Additionally, he is a consultant to the Creighton University CPHHE COVID-19 Project for multimedia communication, messaging development and distribution.

He is the immediate past CEO of Charles Drew Health Center in Omaha, Nebraska. Under his leadership, the Health Center experienced tremendous growth and change in medical, dental and behavioral health services that improved the health outcomes of the community. Dr. Brown's career spans over 35 years of administrative experience in a variety of health services organizations, both private and non-profit that served vulnerable populations.

Additionally, Dr. Brown has taught health services administration courses at four universities. He is a Fellow of the American College of Healthcare Executives. Dr. Brown is a member of the National Association of Health Services Executives, from which he received the Senior Health Services Executive of the Year Award in 2006. He is a co-author of the No. 1 best-selling book *Mission Unstoppable*, a book of inspiring stories of failures and blessings. His chapter is titled "Maximize Your Chance for Greatness."

Dr. Brown has a bachelor's degree in sociology from Missouri University - St. Louis, a master's degree in hospital and health services administration from St. Louis University, and an earned doctorate degree in adult and continuing education from Florida State University.

Dr. Brown is married and is the father of two sons and two daughters and the proud grandfather of three granddaughters and one grandson.



## Kelly K. Dineen, JD, PhD

Kelly K. Dineen is an associate professor of law and the director of the health law program at Creighton University School of Law. She has a secondary appointment as a professor of medical humanities at the Creighton University School of Medicine. Dineen holds a PhD, with distinction, in health care ethics from Saint Louis University, as well as a JD, with a concentration in health care law. She practiced nursing for over a decade before attending law school, first in an intensive care unit and later in a functional neurosurgery practice caring for patients with movement disorders and high impact chronic pain with implanted, programmable devices. In legal practice, Dineen represented health care providers and organizations on a range of matters. Prior to joining Creighton, she held academic and administrative roles at Saint Louis University.

Dineen currently sits on the Global Center for Health Security's Ethics Advisory Committee at the University of Nebraska Medical Center. Dineen has served by invitation for both the American Bar Association and the American Health Lawyers Association on working groups on the opioid crisis, is the current co-chair of the American Bar Association's Opioid Crisis Task Force.

She is the co-editor and author of several chapters in *Prescription Drug Diversion and Pain: History, Policy, and Treatment*, published by Oxford University Press. Her work has been published in leading health law and ethics journals and she is frequently quoted by media outlets, including the *Washington Post*, *Associated Press*, *Vice.com*, and *NPR*.



### **Errik Ejike, MPH**

Errik Ejike received his Bachelor of Science degree in health service administration with a minor in environmental health in 2010 beginning at Kilgore College and completing at Ohio University where he also played Division I football. Ejike earned his Master of Public Health degree at Armstrong Atlantic State University in Savannah, Georgia, in 2013. Ejike currently works and lives in Omaha, where he is the program supervisor for the Center for Promoting Health and Health Equity at Creighton University. He is also the owner and creator of Rooted Rhythm Syndicate LLC—a DJing, production and urban event company. His work experience has been in youth risk reduction of alcohol and other drugs, public health promotion, mental health emergency services for youth, working with an alcohol and drug counseling, and violence/gang intervention. Outside of his job, Ejike volunteers as a mentor and works with the Malcolm X Memorial Foundation.



### **Doris Lassiter**

Doris Lassiter is president and CEO of Doris Lassiter Consulting LLC and project principal associated with the Nebraska Center for Healthy Families, an organization designed to enhance the health and well-being of families through leadership in public and community health practices, policies and partnerships.

Lassiter has worked as a marketing executive in the private health insurance industry for 15 years and 26 years as a public health administrator. She provides consultation to state health and human service agencies, community health agencies, health departments, faith, and community-based agencies on a full range of health and wellness initiatives.

Lassiter was appointed to serve as assistant national director and liaison to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services for the 7.2 million-member National Baptist Convention. She co-led a successful regional project in collaboration with the Federal Office of Minority Health, Morehouse School of Medicine, and the University of Alabama to address heart disease among African-American congregations in the Stroke Belt of the South. She serves as health ministry director for New Era Baptist State Convention of Nebraska, the largest African American organization in the State of Nebraska.

Lassiter is former legislative chair and president of the Nebraska Minority Public Health Association. She is immediate past chair of the Creighton Center for Promoting Health and Health Equity and has served as a partner for 15 years. She is a member of the North Omaha Health Advisory Committee for the CHI Health Immanuel Campus, co-chair of the Empowerment Network's Health and Healthy Families Committee.



## **Kenny D. McMorris, MPA, FACHE, CHCEF**

Kenny D. McMorris is a veteran health care executive, innovator, influencer and strategist. He has served since 2014 as the chief executive officer of Charles Drew Health Center, Inc. where he coordinates business, community and clinical operations for the health center that includes over 180 employees, 15,000 patients and nearly 50,000 outpatient service visits. Under his leadership, the center has expanded to increase service locations from four sites to 10 sites, including primary care, dental, pharmacy and behavioral health services with an emphasis on the underserved.


A native Omahan, Kenny previously served as the first executive director of the 100 Black Men of Omaha and director of marketing and development for the Urban League of Nebraska.

Kenny is active in both the professional and larger community. He is board certified in healthcare management and a Fellow of the American College of Health Care Executives (ACHE), a Community Health Centers Executives Fellow (CHCEF) and holds memberships with National Medical Association (NMA), National Association of Health Services Executives (NAHSE), American Public Health Association (APHA) and Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity Inc. He also serves on the Board of Directors of the Omaha Chamber of Commerce, Heartland Workforce Solutions, Economic Empowerment Center, Health Center Association of Nebraska and Heartland Community Health Network.

Kenny holds an MPA in Public Management from the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

For his commitment to services and community, Kenny has been awarded with the University of Nebraska at Omaha Young Alumni Achievement Award (2015), University of Nebraska at Omaha College of Public Affairs and Community Services Alumni Award of Excellence (2016), National Association of Community Health Centers Betsey K. Cooke Grassroots MVP Award (2017), Urban League of Nebraska African American Leadership Award (2018) and Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated Mid-Western Regional Award for Excellence in Health and Wellness (2019).

Kenny's wife Makayla is the executive director of communications for the University of Nebraska at Omaha. They are the proud parents of two young children Kenny Jr. and Makenli.



## **Rev. Roy J. J. Pereira, SJ, PhD**

Rev. Roy Pereira is the Charles and Mary Heider Endowed Jesuit Faculty Chair in the School of Medicine, Creighton University. He is currently researching the effect of emotions on health and why some are more affected by COVID-19 than others. His earlier research covered the effects of cell phones, internet usage and social media on the brain for which he was invited by Google Headquarters, Mountain View, California, in December 2016 to speak to their employees.

His research also involves the understanding of the mind-body link, the effect of meditation on health outcomes, the placebo effect, neuro feedback and ways of dealing with stress in our lives. In this connection he was invited by Harvard University in January 2017. He has also done a TEDx talk and delivered lectures at various universities in the U.S. and abroad dealing with the fundamental question of consciousness from both a neuroscience and a quantum perspective.



### **Adi M. Pour, PhD**

Adi Pour has been the director of the Douglas County Health Department since 2002. She received her PhD and her master's degree in toxicology from the University of Nebraska Medical Center and completed a post-doctoral fellowship at Creighton University in Molecular Pharmacology. Pour is an adjunct professor of the Department of Health Services, Research and Administration at the College of Public Health, University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC).

She is the recipient of several awards such as the 2007 J.G. Elliot Award given by UNMC to an individual for advancing health care throughout Nebraska. In 2013, Pour received the Tribute to Women Award from the Women's Center for Advancement, and in 2014, she was inducted in The Omaha Hospitality Hall of Fame and received the Champion Award from the Empowerment Network. Pour is on several local boards such as the Women's Fund – Adolescent Health Advisory Board and the Wellbeing Partners, just to name a few. Pour is a Community Investment reviewer for United Way and her passion is to make Douglas County a healthier community by promoting health equity, eliminating health disparities and providing opportunities for all to live a healthy life.



### **Andrea M. Skolkin**

As the chief executive officer of OneWorld Community Health Centers, Andrea Skolkin is known as a visionary and change maker. Since 2004 Skolkin and the OneWorld team has experienced unprecedented growth to address the health care needs of Omaha's most vulnerable by expanding access to quality care, increasing the number of patients, visits and types of services offered at the health center. OneWorld, in partnership with the community, provides culturally respectful quality health care with special attention to the underserved; with the vision of empowering individuals in healthier communities.

Skolkin has served as member of several boards for organizations that focus on improving the lives of all Omahans. Skolkin obtained a master's degree in public administration from Loyola Marymount University and bachelor's degree from the University of Colorado at Boulder. Previously, she spent 17 years as a professor and administrator at Illinois State University. From 2009 to 2014, she served as the assistant and then associate vice president for Academic Fiscal Management in the Office of the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at Illinois State. She also served terms as acting associate provost and assistant provost with a variety of responsibilities including Summer Session, General Education, and Assessment.
