Flash Discussion Events: International Education Planning During the Coronavirus Pandemic

June 19, 2020

"Resources to Support International Students Who Cannot Return to the US During Fall 2020" Summary of Ideas

The past tumultuous few months will have a significant impact on how international education takes place in the future. However, the global mission of the Society of Jesus has not changed and, if anything, is more relevant today than it may have ever been before. The AJCU Conference on International Education Flash Discussion Events are sessions in which participants can share strategies Jesuit institutions are implementing to address common challenges. Such sharing may affirm or enhance current plans, or provide ideas for new strategies or programs, including opening up opportunities for future collaborations among the institutions represented.

The purpose of these sessions is to brainstorm and generate a list of ideas, not to evaluate or critique them. The compilation of ideas provided below is provided so participants can review and evaluate their usefulness for their own institutions and in their own contexts. The two questions below were discussed during this meeting. However, it became clear in the discussion that the same strategies are applicable for both groups -continuing and new international students. Therefore, the responses to both questions appear as a single list.

The list of participants and their contact information is included at the end of the document so you may follow up with questions or opportunities to collaborate. Below is a compilation of plans and ideas that 28 participants from 16 Jesuit universities across the world.

Question 1: What strategies are you considering to support *RETURNING* international students who may not be able to continue their academic program in the US during the Fall 2020 semester?

Question 2: What strategies are you considering to support *NEW* international students who may not be able to arrive in the US to begin their academic program in the US during the Fall 2020 semester?

- Identify a clear centralized contact person for international students' questions and campus community inquiries;
- Conduct orientation and other events in online format:
- Connect students to the alumni network in the students' countries:

- Courses available for international students moved online make sure to connect students with advisors;
- Consider time zone difference offer opportunities in the evenings.
- Include hybrid models for courses (part synchronous / part asynchronous) by structuring conversation partners as part of courses so international students who are abroad can continue to feel part of a class);
- Consider undergraduate and graduate students' academic needs separately offer occasional integrated co-curricular events but generally separate programming may be most effective;
- Flexibility is needed for programs/courses which have a lab component. Negotiate for ways to complete the lab components once student is able to be on campus (i.e. before the beginning of the Spring 2021 semester);
- Offer to assist faculty in communication with students abroad;
- Consider reduced tuition for online courses as a temporary strategy to help students advance in their programs and persist;
- Some institutions are compressing the semester (i.e. finishing before Thanksgiving) and others will conduct in-person courses before Thanksgiving and then complete the semester online.
- Collaborate with Jesuit universities in students home countries to provide your students some supports, possibly even some courses (i.e. apply a study abroad model to students in their home countries);
- Expand contact with students who defer to Spring 2021; the more those students feel like they are connected, the more likely they are to follow through and enroll in Spring 2020;
- Provide accommodations for quarantine once student is able to arrive; offer online support programming during quarantine.
- Institute a "buddy" program with assigned contact frequency between students at abroad and in the US; for example, connect domestic students who are not able to study abroad with international students who are not able to travel to the US;
- Provide frequent updates to students abroad;
- Invite international students who are abroad to submit short video tours of their neighborhoods or favorite locations in home country;
- Make sure international student association has technology support to include students abroad in meetings vary meeting schedule so everyone can remain involved.
- Develop a video demonstrating what online education really entails at your institution;
- Be mindful of the Jesuit ideal of accompaniment and "being there" for students respond gently, and with care to extensive student anxiety, confusion, uncertainty
- Don't be afraid of admitting to students (and others) that we don't know and answer or what final plans will be yet;
- Continue explaining immigration outcomes and advocating about the needs of international students to administration;
- Contextualize COVID-19 as a global issue U.S. perceptions are not global (students may feel safer at home than in the U.S.)

Special Note: The Beijing Center is offering a new program to partner schools to host their Chinese international students at the Beijing Center if these students cannot travel to the US to attend their own universities in the Fall. Programming adjustments will be made for students who would normally be returning to a university in the US (i.e. will look like a usual study abroad program) and for students who were set to begin as new students in a university in the US. For these "new" students' cost will be different (fixed cost including housing; \$10,000 USD to cover everything) and course options will be fixed up to 15 credits. Continuing students can also take courses form their home university in the US. Contact the discussion participants from The Beijing Center listed below for more information.
