- Energy Technology students to update us on their project. This group was ere assigned a project to look at HVAC for the entire campus as a part of their Design and Rapid Prototyping class.
 - Last semester, looked at the entire system. Very open-ended. Need 5-year payback.
 - Decided to steer away from technical aspects, since Facilities and its contractors have that expertise.
 - o Focus on student use. Did focus groups of random people and Deglman Hall.
 - Started with survey. Didn't go to all residence halls and didn't get info needed.
 - Got a good representation of student body with focus group. A great approach.
 - Asked about level of satisfaction. Not good students take their own steps to change things.
 - Don't feel the need to conserve since it's already paid for unless they already have those values.
 - Open to changing habits if there is an incentive
 - Do they report issues? Most didn't know they could. Only complain among themselves. Most didn't know who Facilities Management was.
 - Found that there were 3 types of people: energy conserver, consumer, or everyday user.
 - Students learned how to survey and run a focus group
 - Need to figure out how to get info out to people.
 - Outcome of the project is to implement a contest between residence halls to see who reduces the most.
 - Use display screens in residence halls to display energy use. Not currently working. Not all buildings are metered yet. Most will be metered over the summer. Also add helpful tips for energy reduction and information on how to contact Facilities Management. Optimized Systems may help with funding an incentive.
 - Energy Tech has funding for paid internships for the summer and see if a student could take on this project for the summer and work out the details.
 - Will have as much of a plan in place as possible to hand off to the next person/group
 - Could do per capita or per square foot or percentage reduction
 - Students are very competitive use competition
 - Have RAs/RDs help
- Discussion of pledge (Verdis Group) Verdis group has a proposal to do a sustainability pledge for faculty, staff and students. This is a way to encourage the campus to conserve energy. The group had many thoughts about this proposal:

- o It would bring attention to issues
- Wouldn't hurt to try
- Overhead display might "guilt" them into it.
- o Emails might "guilt" them, too
- Need to target smaller groups
- One-line emails. Even just in subject line, to get it in your brain. Don't need to be long.
- o Seems expensive
 - Is the money better spent putting in motion-detectors, stickers on light switches, etc?
 - Train people to use lights
 - Put money into campaign of awareness
 - Give recommendations to save energy
 - Reward 10% of the savings
 - This could be part of Sustainability Council's charge
 - Submit to Provost, etc for their Updates
 - Could Verdis help with Energy Technology's energy-saving contest instead?
- o Turn off lights in rooms
- Need to create habits. Contagious. Needs to come from Provost, President, etc. Help fund other budget needs.
- Sociology groups are looking into this.
 - Self-interest has short-term effect
 - Better results with altruistic reasoning

- Over the 8-week RecycleMania2015 competition, Creighton recycled 64,773 pounds of materials, which is 6.39 pounds/person. This reduced greenhouse gases equivalent to removing 34 cars from the road for 1 year. That's 174 metric tons of CO₂ equivalent, or the energy consumption of 15 households for a year.
- Purchasing recently received recognition that their efforts to use more sustainable carpet have resulted in the retirement of 29 tons of verified greenhouse gas emissions reduction credits,

which are associated with the entire life cycle (from raw material extraction through end of life) of the carpet. This is the equivalent of 4 households worth of electricity use for the year.
