

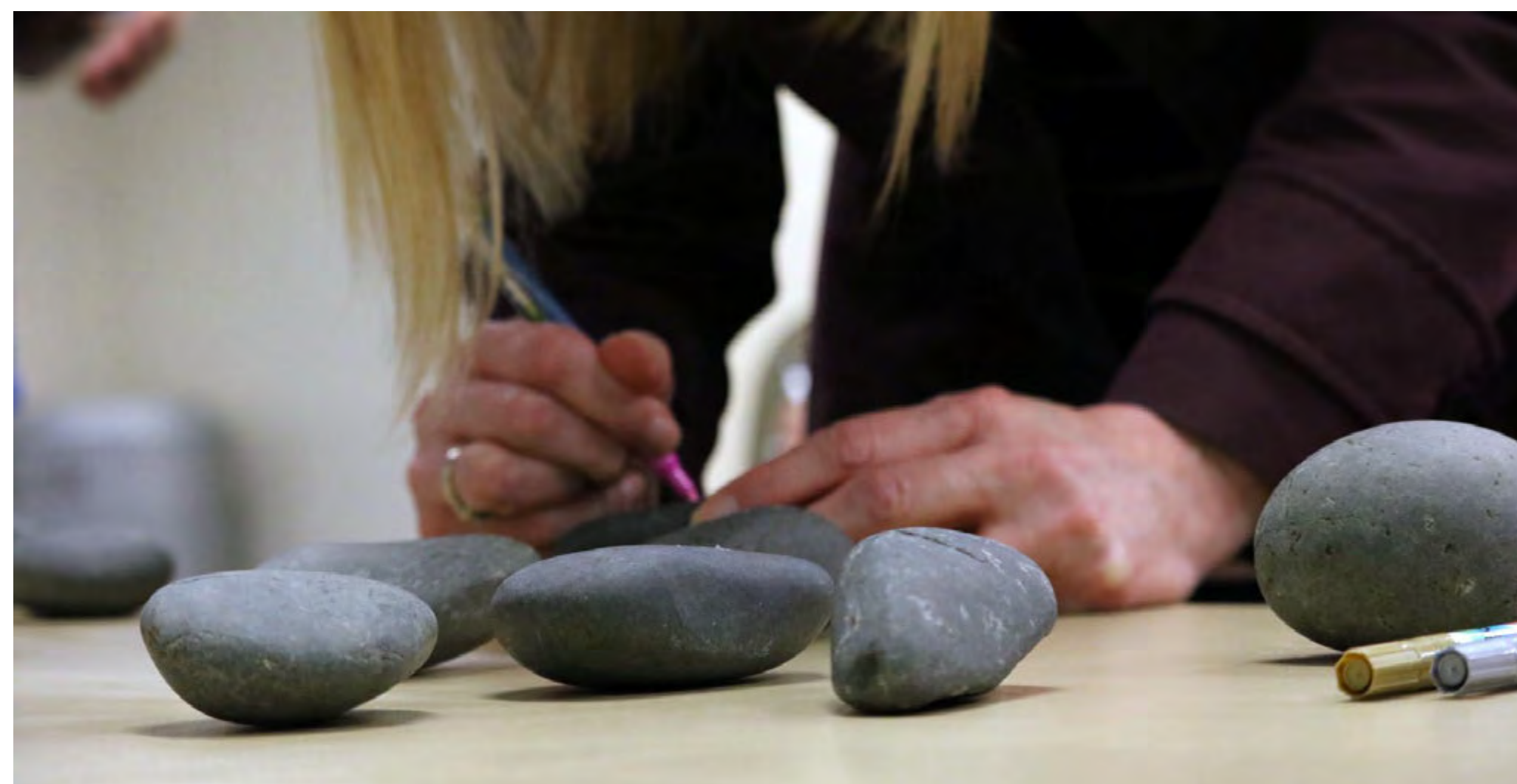
StoneCatcher Training

Active Bystander Training for Bias Related Incidents

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Concept

In **John 8: 1-11** Jesus states in regards to a woman accused of committing adultery, **“Let any one of you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her.”**

Implementation

The training was developed and piloted in May 2017. Trainings have since been delivered to many student groups and to Student Life staff.

Skill development includes:

- Overview of current events in relation to hate and bias related incidents in our country
- Practical ways to intervene and “catch stones”
- The importance of putting the stone down and not throwing it back
- Case studies to practice and process

Additional Takeaways:

All participants are given a stone to decorate to encourage further dialogue.

Expansion

StoneCatcher 2.0 has been developed with a more internal focus.

Skill development includes:

- Listening to learn
- Engaging in dialogue instead of debate
- Reflection to ensure we are not judging others by our own expectations of them
