Undergraduate Programs

College of Arts and Sciences

Charles T. Dickel, Ed.D.

Dr. Charles Timothy (Tim) Dickel will stop at nothing for his students and the overall betterment of the Omaha community. He is a shining example of commitment to Jesuit values, not only being a beacon of these values, but also studying how they are implemented in classrooms and exhibited by students.

Patrick J. Malone, S.J.

Pat Malone, S.J., currently serves as pastor of St. John's parish on the campus of Creighton University. His journey to Creighton has shown a great degree of variety over more than 20 years.

In 2001, he enjoyed the double assignment as associate pastor at the parishes of St. Luke and Immaculate Heart of Mary in St. Paul, Minn. (now combined as St. Thomas More parish) and as the Roman Catholic chaplain at Macalester College. Historical events intervened dramatically during September of that year. By mid-December, Fr. Malone followed the Lord's call to a six-week

service as chaplain at Ground Zero, offering support to firefighters, police officers, emergency medical personnel, construction workers, and volunteers tasked with sifting through heaps of still-smoldering metal and ash for human remains in the wake of the attacks on the World Trade Center towers.

Soon thereafter, Fr. Malone received a new mission that brought him within the university sphere. He took up ministry to students, faculty and local communities at ILAC (Institute for Latin American Concern) in the Dominican Republic. He served there for a number of years and demonstrated his special love for and service to the poor.

After returning to the U.S., Fr. Malone began a different kind of journey, one that took him again to "the frontiers," to the very place that Pope Benedict XVI sent Jesuits in service of the Church. Only this time, it wasn't to a foreign country, but to the border between life and death. He underwent a third bout with leukemia in 2008 that laid him up for months. His strong spirit and will to live met the good work of medical teams and the grace of God to return him to active ministry.

Since the summer of 2011, Fr. Malone has served as pastor at St. John's. He has distinguished himself by fostering the work of the parish Pastoral Council, celebrating the 125th anniversary of the parish, and making himself available to many even while continuing to attend to his health.

Fr. Malone is an educator without being in the classroom, an intellectual without publishing and professional without advanced degrees. Today, his loyalty, service and scholarship revolve around his preaching with his uncanny ability to speak to the hearts of students, religious, parishioner, faculty and Jesuits.



Juliane K. Strauss-Soukup, Ph.D., BS'93

Dr. Juliane K. Strauss-Soukup graduated with a B.S. in chemistry from Creighton University in 1993. She continued her education at the University of Nebraska Medical Center and earned a Ph.D. in biochemistry and molecular biology in 1997. After completing a National Institutes of Health postdoctoral fellowship at Yale, she joined the chemistry department faculty at Creighton University and has been an excellent mentor to students inside and outside the classroom. She has been a Ratio Studiorum Program instructor and has always done a phenomenal job making sure her students have the proper resources to pursue whatever their hearts desire.

Dr. Soukup, professor of biochemistry, has a background in nucleic acid structure and function from her postdoctoral experience and currently has a research lab that focuses on studying the structure and function of a number of riboswitches found in bacteria as well as some potential ones that may exist in mammals.

Last year, Dr. Soukup received the Creighton University Research Award, recognizing her excellence in research. Despite researching on highly complex areas, Dr. Soukup encourages undergraduate students, even at the freshman level, to join her laboratory to learn vital lab techniques and develop critical thinking skills.

When Dr. Soukup is not busy teaching, advising, and researching, she makes sure to bring some of her expertise to her children's lives by annually attending their science fair and managing to find a different experiment every year to wow the kids.
