His service activities at Creighton are extensive, but have always focused on students, including being moderator for Habitat for Humanity and Beta Alpha Psi, and being the incoming faculty advisor to Alpha Sigma Nu.

In 2002, Dr. Purcell received the St. Ignatius Award and in 2006, the University Distinguished Faculty Service Award. He has won numerous regional and national awards in both accounting and education. Since 1999, he has been a daily reflections writer for the University's Online Ministries. Dr. Purcell is known for beginning each class with a reflection or prayer.
