

Rev. Sam Beirao, sJ

Passionate about running, reading and long interesting talks, Sam joined the Society of Jesus in Portugal in 2007 and was ordained a priest in 2018. Sam studied Philosophy at the Catholic University in Portugal, Theology at Comillas in Spain, and Ethics and Education in Boston College, USA. Sam wrote "Servant leadership: the distinctive virtue of Ignatian education," and a number of articles and reviews on education. He served as a campus minister in Colegio das Caldinhas, Portugal, and was the coordinator for pastoral ministry for the Jesuit schools in Portugal. Sam is currently the general coordinator for MAGIS 2023, the event Jesuits organized in the days prior the World Youth Day, which will be held in Portugal in August 2023 with the presence of Pope Francis.



Kate Gaertner, MEd

Kate (Marquette University '04) earned a BA degree in sociology from Marquette University and a MEd in guidance and counseling from Loyola University of Chicago.

As Executive Director of Alpha Sigma Nu from 2004–2022, she called upon her experience and skills as educator, non-profit director, and volunteer manager. In her time at $\Delta\Sigma$ N, the Jesuit honor society has moved from simply honoring students to become a dynamic Ignatian partner, enabling members to be collaborators with the Society of Jesus. Ms. Gaertner fostered connections with Jesuit communities, Ignatian partners, and the Association of Jesuit Colleges and Universities, while promoting Jesuit Curia's priorities to members and chapters. A key priority for Ms. Gaertner has been articulating and communicating the meaning of Alpha Sigma Nu membership, particularly to inductees, to chapter leaders, and to member universities. During her tenure, she visited all 27 Jesuit universities in the U.S., Sogang University in South Korea, Universidad Loyola Andalucia in Spain, Universidad del Pacifico in Lima, Peru, and Regis College Toronto.

Alpha Sigma Nu has been at the vanguard of leveraging technology to expand student and alumni outreach and programming. Ms. Gaertner increased Alpha Sigma Nu's international presence, adding chapters at Universidad Loyola Andalucía and Universidad del Pacífico. She strongly believes in the power of the global Jesuit network and has represented A Σ N to the International Association of Jesuit Universities, the Jesuit Networking Project, and the Jesuit Friends and Alumni Network.

Ms. Gaertner has also been active in the honor society community, representing $\Delta\Sigma N$ in the Association of College Honor Societies. She served on its board of directors and as chair of its nominating committee.

Prior to coming to Alpha Sigma Nu, Kate founded and directed Compass Alliance, a community based organization providing a venue for prevention programming and advocacy funded by an Office of National Drug Control Policy grant that she co-authored.

Dr. Saint-Jean is a renown international speaker, and author of many books in Portuguese, French and English. Dr. Saint-Jean presently teaches psychology at Creighton University, and conducted research on race and intergenerational trauma while holding a practice on trauma and multiple personality disorder. Sarah Singletary Walker

Walker graduated summa cum laude while earning her Bachelor's degree in Psychology from Dillard University in New Orleans. She has a PhD in Industrial/Organizational Psychology from Rice University in Houston, Texas. Her training in Industrial/Organizational Psychology provides her specific expertise in diversity, recruitment, selection, training, testing and measurement. She is the Vice President for the Division of Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion at Creighton University and is also a Full Professor in the Heider College of Business at Creighton. As Vice President, Walker is overseeing the strategic direction of initiatives designed to attract and retain students, faculty, and staff. Her research interests are directly related to this work and includes examining the experiences of marginalized individuals (e.g., racioethnic minorities, pregnant women, LGBTQIA, older workers) at work with a specific focus on individual and organizational-level strategies for creating more equitable workplaces.

Prior to joining Creighton University in 2018, Walker served as an Associate Professor in the Marilyn Davies College of Business at the University of Houston – Downtown (UHD) for ten years. While at UHD, Walker co-authored two federally funded grants which resulted in \$1.1 million in federal grant funds. The federally funded grants were designed to increase opportunities for underrepresented minorities in graduate degree programs.

She remains an active researcher and has published in a variety of applied psychology and management journals throughout her career including the *Journal of Business and Psychology, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion, Industrial and Organizational Psychology Perspectives*, and the *Journal of Applied Psychology*.



Rev. Daniel Villanueva, SJ

Daniel Villanueva is a Spanish Jesuit, Computer Science Engineer (University of Valladolid), Licentiate in Moral Social Theology (Boston College) and Global Executive MBA by Georgetown University and ESADE. He has post-graduate degrees in Humanitarian Aid (Fordham University) and Leadership, Innovation and NGO Management (ESADE). His main areas of specialization are networks, digital communications, global citizenship, international development and education.

Since 2008 he has worked at Entreculturas – Fe y Alegría Spain with different responsibilities: Africa Department Coordinator (2008–2011), Assistant Director (2012–2014), General Director (2015–2017). Since January 2018 he is Executive Vice President of Entreculturas and Alboan and Responsible for the International Development of the Society of Jesus in Spain.

His thesis is titled "The Jesuit Way of Going Global" and since 2012 he is leading the Jesuit. Network project focused on the evolution of networks and international collaboration dynamics around the Jesuit Mission. He has given multiple workshops and talks on networks, global citizenship or communication.

Rev. Seán Michaelson, SJ, PhD

Seán Michaelson, SJ, is the Executive Secretary/Socius for the Jesuit Conference of Canada and the United States. He earned a bachelor's degree in English at Georgetown University, and a master's degree from Boston College. Fr. Michaelson entered the Society of Jesus in 1996, later earning an MA in philosophy from Fordham and a PhD in 18th-century British and Irish satire from Arizona State University. His theology studies include an MDiv and a MA in theology from Regis College. Fr. Michaelson taught at the Colegio del Sagrado Corazon in Montevideo, Uruguay, before joining the English department at the University of San Francisco as an assistant professor. In addition to serving as chair of the English department, Fr. Michaelson was the director of the St. Ignatius Institute and the adviser for Alpha Sigma Nu. Before his current role at the Jesuit Conference, he served for three years as formation director for the California and Oregon Province Jesuits, responsible for the training of the provinces' men preparing to be Jesuit brothers and priests.

Michael Williams, SJ, PhD, is Emeritus Associate Professor of English and Chapter Adviser at Spring Hill College. He entered the Society of Jesus in 1962. With triple undergraduate majors in Classics, Philosophy, and English, he was awarded a full doctoral fellowship at the University of Southern California to pursue studies in English, with specialization in Medieval Literature. After theological studies at the Jesuit School of Theology at Berkeley, he served as Associate Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Gonzaga University. In 1985, he left academic administration to return to the classroom at Spring Hill College. He has lived in a student residence hall for over 30 years as a Jesuit chaplain, valuing the deeper interaction with students. He is also faculty adviser and member of three student organizations to the Knights of Columbus club, and Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity. He served as chair of the department of English and as chair of the Faculty Assembly.

Francisco de Borja Martín Garrido, PhD
