PROFESSIONAL FORMATION AND CRITICAL SELF-REFLECTION

The student will use a process of deliberative self-reflection to enhance their understanding of self and engage in continued professional formation. Professional identity formation reflects the following core values: accountability, altruism, compassion, excellence, integrity, professional duty and social responsibility.

COMMUNICATION SKILLS

The student will read, write, speak, listen and use media and technology to communicate effectively. The students will demonstrate respectful, positive and culturally appropriate interpersonal behaviors in the counsel and education of patients and families, as well as when communicating with other healthcare professionals.

CRITICAL THINKING AND CLINICAL JUDGMENT

The student will acquire, comprehend, apply, synthesize and evaluate information, integrating these abilities to identify, resolve and prevent problems and make appropriate decisions. The student will demonstrate the behaviors of the scholarly clinician by developing and utilizing the process of critical thinking and systematic inquiry for clinical reasoning, decision-making and exercising sound, critical judgment.





LEARNING AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The student will consistently strive to expand their knowledge and skills to maintain professional competence and contribute to the body of knowledge. The student will demonstrate the ability to gather, interpret and evaluate data to assess the suitability, accuracy and reliability of information from reference sources.

ETHICAL FOUNDATION AND MORAL AGENCY

The student will practice ethically, fulfilling an obligation to demonstrate moral responsibility and social justice. The student will identify, analyze and resolve ethical problems.

SOCIAL AWARENESS, LEADERSHIP AND ADVOCACY

The student will provide service to the community and the profession, assume responsibility for proactive collaboration with other healthcare professionals in addressing patient needs and be prepared to influence the development of ethical and humane healthcare regulations and policies that are consistent with the needs of the patient and society.

PATIENT EXAMINATION

The student will perform a thorough patient interview with appropriate medical history and review of systems as well as a physical examination using appropriate tests and measures.

PATIENT EVALUATION AND PHYSICAL THERAPY DIAGNOSIS

The student will interpret the results of the physical therapy examination and other diagnostic procedures, synthesize pertinent data and then formulate an accurate physical therapy diagnosis. The evaluation process also may identify the need for consultation with or referral to other healthcare providers.

PATIENT PROGNOSIS

The student will predict the level of optimal improvement that a patient may attain through intervention within a given time.

PATIENT INTERVENTION

The student will design an appropriate, customized plan of care consistent with the physical therapy diagnosis and prognosis and the patient's/family's expectations and goals. The student will also assume responsibility for delegating patient care activities and supervising those entrusted with them.

PATIENT RE-EXAMINATION/ RE-EVALUATION

The student will perform an accurate re-examination and re-evaluation to determine changes in patient status and to modify or redirect physical therapy intervention. This process also may identify the need for consultation with or referral to other healthcare providers.

PATIENT OUTCOMES

The student will track the results of physical therapy management, which may include the following domains: pathology; impairments; functional limitations; participation; risk reduction/prevention; wellness; community and societal resources and patient satisfaction.

SYSTEMS MANAGEMENT

The student will identify the specific contribution of physical therapy management within the health care system and the influence of health care policy on that system. In addition, the student will demonstrate knowledge and be able to effectively interact within the independent framework of the healthcare team in a complex society. The student will extend their responsibility for physical therapy beyond individual patients to include care of communities and populations.

Creighton develops students through interprofessional, team-based education for compassionate care, inspiring them to focus on patients' minds, bodies and spirits. We designed our curriculum and constructed the new CL Werner Center for Health Sciences Education building to reflect our Jesuit values.

The CL Werner Center for Health Sciences Education prepares our graduates for collaborative care. Advanced technology and equipment, as well as carefully designed instructional space provides the environment for students to step seamlessly from the classroom to clinics and medical centers.

Overall, the Omaha campus enrolls over 3,000 students in health professions schools and colleges, with an additional estimated 1,500 students pursuing undergraduate degrees leading to professional school admission. More than half of our entire student body pursues



health sciences careers. Sixty percent of our incoming first-year students arrive at Creighton to study the health sciences, with one-third choosing pre-medical majors. The health sciences are integral to Creighton's mission.

The CL Werner Center integrates our resources, builds proficiency in our students and prepares them for complex social environments to meet the evolving demands of clinical practice.

The 195,000-square-foot interprofessional campus at Park Central in the midtown area of Phoenix accommodates nearly 900 students, including future physicians, nurses, occupational therapists, physical therapists, pharmacists and physician assistants. Students learn side-by-side from and with each other—understanding the importance of each health profession to the patient's overall care. Interprofessional or team-focused education encourages students to work together to learn and deliver the best quality care.

The facility features cutting-edge technology, equipment and spaces to enrich Creighton's Jesuit education. On campus and in the community, students have opportunities to develop healthcare skills from a values-based curriculum and hands-on experiences.

Technology is infused throughout the classroom to enhance the learning experience, including the potential for synchronous teaching between campuses. Learners benefit from opportunities for both formal and informal interactions. The building has multiple open areas on each floor for student socialization and studying and an outdoor terrace with seating and charging stations. Although the campus is in the walkable Park Central area of midtown Phoenix, a café in the building provides another option for student breaks. These diverse spaces become landing spots for students, faculty and staff to study, meet and share conversation.

Clinical Opportunities



Omaha and Phoenix— Two Programs, One Creighton

Our program offers significantly more clinical education time than the national average for PT programs. This extended hands-on experience maximizes opportunities for Creighton students to develop advanced professional skills and excel in interprofessional collaboration. We focus on developing each student's professional expertise, technical skills, application of theory, clinical reasoning and deliberate and moral action. Additionally, we prioritize interprofessional socialization and education. Clinical experience is critical for developing these skills, so we expose our students to more hours than most programs.

When Does Clinical Education Occur?

A six-week clinical experience occurs at the end of the third semester. The fifth semester concludes with another six-week experience. After completing the didactic curriculum, seventh semester consists of a 16-week experience followed by another 16-week experience in semester eight. The last two experiences are frequently split to include different types of patients at the same site.

Where Are Creighton's Sites Located?

The Department of Physical Therapy has over 450 clinical agreements with nearly 1,000 clinical sites in 45 states and the Dominican Republic. Our clinical education faculty work closely with you to determine what opportunities best fit your educational and professional goals. You'll have significant support as you move through a well-thought-out program of experiences. Sites are contacted in the spring and offer slots for the following year.



Residents enroll in the year-long program to gain advanced knowledge and skills within a specialty area of practice through clinical practice experience, clinical mentoring, teaching, research and service opportunities. Creighton students interact and learn from residents in the integrated laboratory series, where residents help reinforce clinical connections from the classroom.

With 10–20% of recent graduating classes pursuing residency education, many students seek a clinical specialization after jump-starting their career at Creighton.

Take the time to pursue your passion for sports, public health or performing arts. Sharpen your skills in pediatric oncology or at a burn center. Our longer clinical experiences allow you the time to explore your interests and find your niche. With academic medical partners in Omaha, Phoenix and throughout the country, you can gain hands-on experience in a variety of settings.

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Admission Information

Congratulations on everything you've done to reach this stage in your professional journey to the School of Pharmacy and Health Professions.

We know you've worked hard, and we want to help make the next step as smooth as possible. We love talking to prospective students and encourage you to schedule an appointment with our admission staff.

Application Process and Scholarships

The Creighton University School of Pharmacy and Health Professions Physical Therapy program participates in the centralized application system ptcas.org. Applicants are encouraged to apply early. We review applications on a rolling basis and award admission-based scholarships throughout the admission cycle. Once interview seats are full, we may be unable to interview additional qualified candidates.

Before completing your application, please learn more about our admissions requirements below.

To apply, submit an online application and all supporting materials through PTCAS, a physical therapy centralized application service, which includes:

 An official transcript received from each institution the applicant has attended and/ or is currently attending. Official transcripts must be received directly from the issuing institution(s).

- · Three letters of recommendation.
- Proof of a minimum of 60 hours of observation supervised by a licensed physical therapist.
- Applicants will be considered for an interview prior to the completion of observation hours. Admitted candidates will be required to complete the minimum number of observation hours by August 1 of the year they matriculate. It is highly recommended that candidates complete observation hours prior to their interview.

Starting in the 2024 application cycle, a GRE score is NOT required, nor will any submitted scores be considered as part of the review process. The GRE was removed to promote our holistic admissions process.

Prerequisites

For admission into the Doctor of Physical Therapy programs at Creighton University, you must meet the following requirements:

- A minimum of 90 semester hours or 136 quarter hours is required before entering the programs.
- Students who do not hold a baccalaureate degree must take coursework that includes in-depth upper division study in one discipline comparable to a minor at Creighton University prior to matriculation (18 semester hours).
- Strong academic performance is considered paramount; the degree of emphasis is secondary.
- Prerequisite courses may be completed at any regionally accredited institution and must be completed with a grade of C or better (a C- grade is not acceptable). All prerequisite coursework must be completed by August 1 of the desired year of entry.

*The chemistry and physics courses must be a two-semester, eight-hour or equivalent course sequence. A course sequence is considered to be a correlated pair of courses offering in-depth coverage of a specific field and must be at a level such that the courses would be acceptable as prerequisites to advance toward a baccalaureate degree in that discipline. For chemistry and biology courses, survey courses, courses without associated laboratories, courses designed for non-science majors, online science courses utilizing a laboratory kit or abbreviated courses targeted toward health science majors are not acceptable as prerequisite science courses. Applicants must have completed 16 of the 27 prerequisite science courses or equivalent prior to the application deadline.
