If you haven't already, please consider registering to attend the inaugural <u>Population Health Symposium</u>, which officially launches the University's new Institute for Population Health. The Oct. 23 and 24 symposium features national and University presenters and is open to the public, so please invite others in the community to register as well. Population health encompasses all of the disciplines represented on our campuses and its focus on health equity is uniquely tied to Creighton's mission. Livestreaming is available for the Phoenix campus. The symposium will be a momentous event for our University, and I hope you will be a part of it.

In related news, faculty are also encouraged to apply for the <u>President's Fund in Population Health grants</u> through Nov. 17. Funding is for one or two years, up to \$25,000 per year. And, congratulations to the Center for Promoting Health and Health Equity, which is a superb example of Creighton living out our mission, on receiving a <u>\$1M public health grant from the CDC</u>. The grant funds the first year of a five-year cooperative agreement to promote nutrition, physical activity, immunizations and breastfeeding support among Omaha's Black and Latino communities. The CDC has funded 44 agencies across 28 states through this program, and Creighton is the only Nebraska awardee and among only 10 universities to have been awarded.

We are so proud that Creighton's new freshman residence, Graves Hall, is the first North American facility to use an <u>innovative solar thermal technology</u>. This will significantly save the University water heating costs and assist in achieving sustainability goals. Congratulations to all those who helped make this possible.

One more reminder to all faculty and staff: Please take the time (approximately five minutes) to participate in the <u>annual employee census this month</u>. Each fall semester this information is updated and is valuable to many key University processes. Thank you for your assistance.

### **NIH Grants Awarded to Medicine Professors**

#### Padilla to Present at U.N. Forum

René Padilla, PhD, vice provost for Global Engagement, has been invited to present his research at the United Nations High Commission on Refugees' triennial Global Refugee Forum in Geneva, Switzerland, on Dec. 12, 2023. Padilla's session, titled Enhancing Sustainable Humanitarian Chains to Guarantee a Healthy Environment in Refugee Settlements, was nominated by the UN's Middle East and North Africa Civil Society Network for Displacement as an innovative conditional cash transfer and triangular cooperation model that has demonstrated strong outcomes with Syrian and other refugees.
